TODAY'S MUSIC

In a world of constant, and sometimes uncontrollable change, we can return to scripture. The Book of Psalms from the Old Testament is still today a source of strength and guidance. In 1997, the lauded Scottish composer, James MacMillan, used the text from Psalm 96 in his choral work, "A New Song." Composed just a few years after the World Wide Web was made public, the work seeks to praise God above all. Each choral part has its own intrinsic and unique rhythmic direction, all coming together to create a glorious sound. Perhaps this is akin to our individual lives coming together for the common good; you might say, for the sake of humanity. "A Vineyard Grows" sets a wonderful poem by Jaroslav J. Vajda to an English folk song. This lyrical and cheerful piece reminds us that God's presence and promise are ever true, even in times of challenge.
