## Worship Notes

### PRAYER OF CONFESSION

The Prayer of Confession is from Call to Worship: Liturgy, Music, Preaching & the Arts, 59.1

### TODAY'S MUSIC

In this second week of Lent, and the second in our Sermon Series, we hear themes of angst and grief, which provided the jumping point for me to consider a multiplicity of musical options (who knew there was so much to choose from on this particular subject). We hear music of Johannes Brahms, his popular Geistliches Lied, pairing soaring musical lines with an evocative seventeenth-century text. The Sanctuary Choir also presents Stephen Paulus' Pilgrims' Hymn, a work that gives hope for the future, putting our faith, trust, and hope in God.

Organ Music by Brahms is offered as the Prelude, the Postlude is a rousing work by the English organist, Herbert Howells. His Rhapsody in C-sharp minor was composed in a single night in March 1918. It was written in York while the city was under fire from German air raids. Grief and angst fill the work from its very opening, but perhaps the triumphant ending speaks to hope and light, even in times of adversity.
