TODAY'S MUSIC

Today we face the Resurrection in our Gospel Lesson, and thus presents a challenge; how do we seek to add commentary to the story amidst the season of Lent. Though each and every Sunday is a “Mini Easter,” we still find ourselves traversing the forty days of wilderness. To mark this, two anthems reflect on the message of the Lent and Easter story, yet in a sombre and reflective tone. “God So Loved the World” by the contemporary British composer, Bob Chilcott, takes a fresh look at the text in this intimate setting of a well-known passage. Howells’ “Like as the Hart” is a perennial favorite among choirs all around the globe. It sets just the first three verses of Psalm 42, asking “Where is now thy God?” Though the question is never answered within the work, its calm, serene, and dutifully bright ending gives clarity over the question. We also mark International Women’s Day today with two works by female composers. The first Prelude, by Elsa Barraine, is a wonderful work from the 20th-century French school. A prolific composer, her work has largely been forgotten. The Bells of Bryn Mawr offer a second Prelude on a popular hymn tune, arranged by Valerie W. Stephenson.
