

FIRST LESSON Exodus 14:26-31

(pg. 61 in pew Bible)

Then the Lord said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers." So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Today's prayer of confession is taken from Call to Worship: Liturgy, Music, Preaching & the Arts, 59.1

TODAY'S MUSIC

I have always loved surveying a range of musical styles within Worship. Like the body of faith who diligently meets here on Sundays, we bring our own thoughts, ideas, notions, and our own faith to the corporate act of Worship. This week, as we continue our journey through the particular scripture from the Gospel according to John, we see a veritable musical feast on offer. Music of the Baltic States is becoming more and more popular on this side of the Atlantic, and music by Estonian composer Ēriks Ešvalds is part of this trend. His luminous setting of the age-old familiar hymn "Amazing Grace" (located at #649 in your pew hymnals) with a luxurious, almost symphonic effect. Soaring melodies, driven harmonies, and no unifying breath allow

this work to lift off the page and into the skies above, perhaps reminiscent of our Gospel lesson today. Handel's "Messiah" is a true masterpiece; composed in 1741, I'd hasten to say it has enjoyed an unbroken legacy of music making in all corners of the Earth. The rousing Chorus "Surely He Has Borne Our Grievs" from Part 2 (which leads us to the Resurrection with the "Hallelujah" Chorus) is a reminder of God's unending love for us, even in times of trial, and in times of disbelief.
