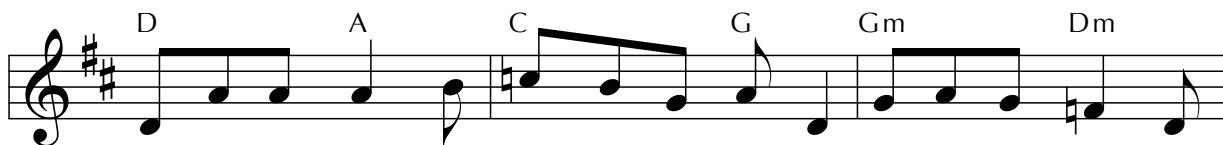

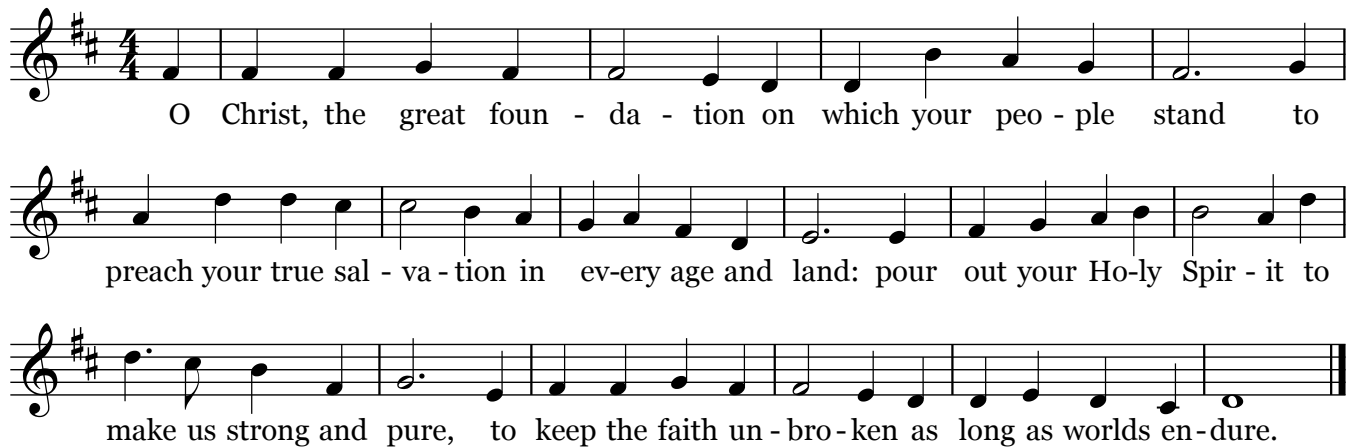

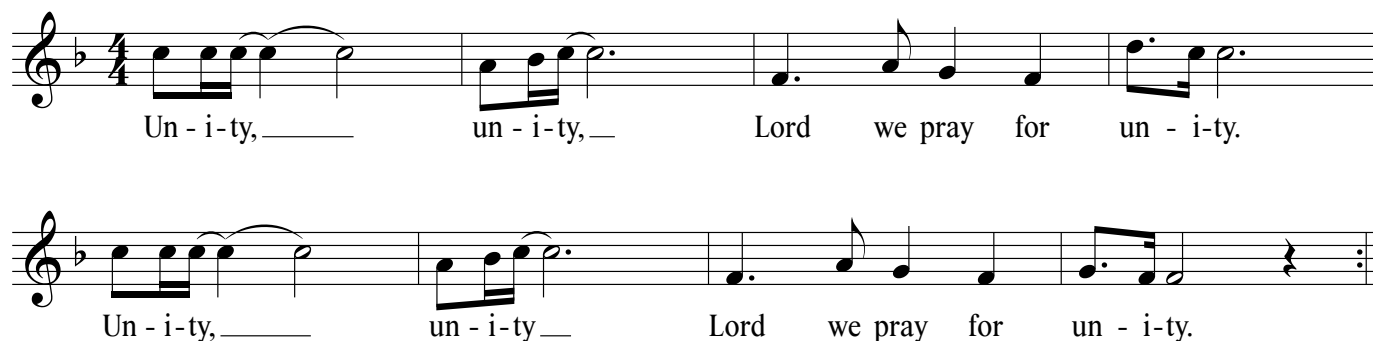

TODAY'S MUSIC

World Communion Sunday is a celebration observed by several Protestant denominations, taking place on the first Sunday of every October, that promotes Christian unity and ecumenical cooperation. It is a tradition initiated in 1933 by Hugh Thomson Kerr, who ministered at the Shadyside Presbyterian Church. In that spirit of unity, today's choral music comes from America's African American singing tradition. This repertoire, encompassing spirituals and, in the 20th century, gospel music, is sung all over the world. The choir witnessed its unique way of speaking directly to the human spirit in concert tours throughout Europe, South Africa, Cuba and Brazil. It was this repertoire that brought French audiences to their feet this past summer. Total Praise is a stirring setting of Psalm 121. Richard Smallwood wrote the song, during a time when he was serving as a caregiver to his mother who was experiencing dementia and a family friend who was dying of cancer. Smallwood explained, "I felt left by God, I was trying to write a pity-party song, but God pulled me to do a praise song. God said, 'I want your praise no matter what the situation you are in, good or bad.' It's about trusting him." Unity is an earnest plea for peace. "Lord, we pray for unity" becomes an endless refrain which in today's brokenness seems especially timely. (Note that you will be invited to join the choir during the chorus of Unity.) This morning's postlude, Voices of the World was composed for the 2023 Coronation of King Charles III in Westminster Abbey, London. It was commissioned as a tribute to the Commonwealth of Nations, and the piece quotes traditional melodies from a number of different Commonwealth countries. They are nearly all derived from popular or folk sources, and represent a tiny snapshot of the huge variety of global musical traditions. All the melodies are grouped together by their continents: Africa (Nigeria, Zambia, Ghana, South Africa), Asia (India, Pakistan), North America (Canada, Jamaica), Australasia (Australia), and Europe (UK).
