TODAY'S MUSIC

Even in the midst of a world in chaos, we find beauty all around; from sitting in this Sanctuary (or watching online), to the many conversations, meetings, gatherings, discussions, and events that take place here every week, to experiencing beauty in all aspects of life, including that of listening to music. The Sanctuary Choir offers two anthems that speak to the beauty of music today; the first by the British composer Herbert Howells, a pillar of the Anglican Choral Tradition, setting many settings of evening canticles, mass settings, a plethora of organ music fit for the sacred and secular spheres, and a healthy output of anthems. A Hymn for St. Cecilia (the Patron Saint of music) was commissioned by the Worshipful Company of Musicians. It sets a text by poet and writer Ursula Vaughan Williams, the second wife of Ralph Vaughan Williams. One can see the perfect marriage between text and music, as we offer our unending thanks for the gift of music, of which we're all the fortunate consumers. The second anthem is by the Norwegian composer, Kim André Arnesen, written as a gift to Dr. Anton Armstrong and the famed St Olaf Choir. Similarly to the Howells, this work allows us to recommit ourselves as the temporary custodians of this art form; the way music interacts with our being, with each other, how it interacts with the world around us, and our gratefulness for the beauty of music in this place.
