SUNDAY MORNING DISCUSSION GROUP


Starting January 12, 8:30 a.m.

PROBLEMATIC PARABLES



Mondays, February 3, 10, 17, 7:00 p.m. Witherspoon Parlor, Ministries Center




DR. MICHAEL E. MANN

The New Climate War: The Fight to Take Back Our Planet Monday, April 7, 7:00 p.m. Sanctuary

Human-caused climate change is one of the greatest threats to civilization. For decades, denial and attacks on the science have delayed action. Now, polluting interests are using new strategies to deflect attention, divide activists, and promote false solutions that allow continued fossil fuel use. These tactics include shifting focus from systemic change to individual behavior, using doomist narratives to disempower, and promoting solutions that don't address the root issue. While the need for action is urgent, we still have the power to make meaningful change—if we act now and act boldly.

Dr. Mann is Presidential Distinguished Professor of Earth & Environmental Science at the University of Pennsylvania and director of the Penn Center for Science, Sustainability and the Media.

HOW THE WORD IS PASSED

In How the Word Is Passed, Clint Smith examines the legacy of slavery in America through a journey across landmarks and monuments. Blending history, personal narrative, and interviews, Smith reveals how different places confront or obscure the truths of slavery's impact. From Monticello to Angola Prison, he explores the enduring scars of racial injustice. Smith's poignant storytelling challenges readers to reckon with the past to better understand America's present and future.
