

One: This first candle we light to remember those whom we have loved and lost. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices, the memory that binds us to them in life and in death, especially in this season of Advent and Christmas.

All: O God, may your eternal love and peace surround them. (Silence)

One: The second candle we light represents the wide range of losses we experience and grieve – broken relationships, the loss of health, jobs, faith that used to be certain, and dreams that have shattered.

All: Heal, reconcile and renew us, as you lead us into a future of hope. (Silence)

One: The third candle we light to remember the sadness we share with one another. We pause to remember the moments of disbelief, emptiness, anger and anxiety. We acknowledge our own misplaced priorities and our failures to work for the common good.

All: May the dawn defeat the night, and light defeat darkness. (Silence)

One: The fourth candle we light to remember God's promises and the gift of peace which the Christmas story offers the world. We remember those suffering the ravages of war, the forced migrations, the plight of hunger and homelessness. May the Christ, who shares human pain and suffering, lead us to new life and provide abundant life for all.

All: Show us the way, and increase our faith that the darkness of this world will not overcome your light. (Silence)

One: Jesus said, "I am the light of the World.

All: Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but have the light of life." Amen.
