



**HOMEGROWN NATIONAL PARK.** 11:15 a.m., Congregational Hall. Join us as Doug Tallamy presents on Homegrown National Park, a national challenge to create diverse ecosystems in our yards, communities, and surrounding lands by reducing lawn, planting native, and removing invasives. We are losing many native plant and animal species which jeopardizes our natural life support, but if many people make small changes, healthy ecological networks can be restored.

THE NATURE OF OAKS. 2:00 p.m., Congregational Hall. Join us for Doug Tallamy's second presentation where he continues the discussion about how homeowners can take action by planting natives, specifically focusing on oaks. Oaks support more species of animals, sequester more carbon, protect our watersheds, and nourish soil communities better than any other plant genus in North America. Tallamy will discuss these roles by highlighting what happens with the oaks in his yard each season.
